- 40. If a woman seeks medical care right away, a health care provider can prescribe medication that will prevent her from becoming pregnant.
- 41. A person who is raped may need to be checked for sexually transmitted infections.
- 42. Date and acquaintance rape is illegal.
- 43. People who have been raped by someone they know have the same legal options as those raped by a stranger.
- 44. The decision to press charges is very personal. It may help the victim feel more in control.
- 45. Some people decide not to press charges. They may not want to go through a trial or have other people know about the rape.
- 46. People who rape rarely do so only once.
 Pressing charges may help stop someone from raping again.
- 47. If someone tells you she or he has been raped, the best thing you can do is to listen and be supportive.
- 48. Believing the victim is one of the most important ways you can be supportive.
- 49. No one wants to be raped. No one asks to be raped.
- 50. Rape is never the victim's fault. Never.



50 Things Everyone Should Know About Date and Acquaintance Rape

- 1. Date rape is when someone you have been dating forces you to have sex.
- 2. Date rape can happen the first time people go out together. It can happen after they have been dating for a while.
- 3. Acquaintance rape is when someone you know but are not necessarily dating rapes you.
- 4. In the U.S., a rape occurs every 8 minutes.
- 5. About 66 percent of all rapes are by someone the person knows a friend, boyfriend, relative or other acquaintance.
- 6. An attacker may use physical force or a weapon.
- 7. Even if the person doesn't use physical force, it can still be rape.
- 8. Many date rapes don't involve weapons.
- 9. If someone threatens another person in order to have sex, it is rape.
- 10. If someone doesn't take no for an answer, it is rape.

- 11. Everyone has the right to say no to sex at any time.
- 12. You have the right to say no if you have been kissing or if you are dressed in sexy clothes.
- 13. You have the right to say no even if you have had sex with this person before.

- 16. If you don't know what your partner wants, it is your responsibility to stop and ask.
- 17. If your partner is unclear or says no and you try to talk her or him into having sex, it could turn into a rape.
- 18. A man's size and physical presence may scare a woman without him realizing it. She may not say no if she is afraid she may be hurt.
- 19. Sexual excitement does not justify forced sex.
- 20. Date rape is not an act of passion. It is a crime of violence.
- 21. Date rape is not about miscommunication. It is about power and control.
- 22. Alcohol and other drugs often play a part in date rape.
- 23. Having sex with someone who is too drunk or high to say no is rape.
- 24. The most common date rape drug is alcohol.
- 25. Other drugs that are sometimes used as date rape drugs include GHB (liquid Ecstasy), Rohypnol (roofies) and ketamine (special K).
- 26. Not drinking alcohol and not using drugs may help you stay safer.
- 27. Men can be raped. About ten percent of rape victims are male.
- 28. Trust your instincts. If someone does not listen to you or makes you feel uncomfortable, you may be in danger.

- 29. If you are going on a date with someone you do not know well, meet in a public place.
- 30. If someone is pushing you to have sex when you don't want to, say no clearly.
- 31. Move away from the person. Yell for help.
- 32. If you can, get away.
- 33. Sometimes it's not safe to resist a rape. The rape is still not your fault.
- 34. Rape is emotionally devastating.
- 35. A person who is raped by someone she or he knows may have a hard time trusting other people.
- 36. If you are raped, get help right away.
- 37. Tell a trusted friend or family member.
- 38. Call a rape crisis line. You will get help with your feelings and find out where to go for medical care.
- 39. See a doctor immediately, before you take a shower.
